Stan had lived an amazing life even though it was rather short. I can sum up my enjoyment for the few times of being around Stan in one short story about another funeral we attended together. Stan and I were both in suits. You can tell how important this funeral was as I think it was one of few events I saw Stan wear a suit. We went into a restaurant to have breakfast before the funeral and as we were waiting, I had asked Stan, “Where the hell did you get that blue suit, the white lining is all hanging out on both sides. He spun around a few times to straighten it out and more of the white lining had shown through. After arguing that it looked OK, he stuck both hands in the two side pockets and pulled out a 45 automatic and the longest barreled 38 I ever saw!! The white lining disappeared. He suggested “He was not going anyplace without a little piece of mind”. He clearly understood that making mistakes along the way, just makes getting there, with the people you love, so much better. In closing, I think Stan was ready to meet his maker. Whether his maker is prepared for the ordeal of meeting the fullness of him is another matter.
