



Virginia Margaret Bach

August 22, 1919 - August 2, 2009

Virginia A. Bach died August 2, 2009 at Newnan Nursing & Rehabilitation Center, in Newnan, Georgia, after a long illness. Mrs. Bach had been a resident of Newnan since 1998 and was a member of the First United Methodist Church. The former Virginia Margaret Anderson was born in Kansas City, Missouri in 1919 to the late Margaret Roberts Anderson and Arthur R. Anderson. She moved to California with her parents in the mid-1920s where she grew up in Santa Monica, graduating from Santa Monica High School in 1937. She was united in matrimony with Roland W. Bach in 1938 at the Westwood Community Church (Methodist), Los Angeles. The couple raised two children while living in Fallbrook, California, which they called home for 31 years before retiring to Winthrop, Washington. After the death of her husband in 1987, Mrs. Bach lived in Ashland, Oregon until her move to Newnan. She was a school librarian, and dedicated many volunteer hours to church and youth organizations. She was awarded life membership in the Women's Society of Christian Service (W.S.C.S.), a Methodist Church group. She was an avid reader and enjoyed gardening, sewing, photography, and foreign travel. She is survived by her son, Steven A. Bach of Newnan, Georgia, her daughter, Marjorie A. Mota of Lakewood, California, her grandson, Daniel R. Mota of Harbor City, California, and numerous family members throughout the United States.
